Project Title	Wildflowers of the River Colne	
Project Description Max 100 words	EPIKS has been developing a Riverside Nature Park in Huddersfield for the past two years so that people can get close to the River Colne and enjoy wildlife near the town centre. Since 2021 we have completed 350 hours of volunteer activity from our regular volunteer group, Huddersfield University and Kirklees College students. We have cleared rank vegetation, litter and invasive species; upgraded and created new paths and rescued a meadow from buddleia encroachment. This grant will help to increase the number of wildflowers at Snow Island and Aspley riverside, provide education and awareness and increase visitor footfall.

This grant funding will give us a chance to focus on improving the diversity of wildflowers, making sites more attractive and increasing visitor footfall at Snow Island and Aspley Riverside.

We will work with new and existing volunteers to carry out the following practical tasks:

Cutting and weeding a 300m2 wildflower meadow

Removing invasive species like Himalayan balsam and buddleia

Saving seeds from the meadow and riverbanks for reseeding elsewhere

Managing vegetation to protect a population of rare wild daffodils


Moving and splitting marsh marigolds

We will provide education about our threatened wildflowers and attract new visitors by:

Running a guided walk/ talk on the wildflowers of the river Colne.

Provide an accompanying social media campaign to raise awareness of the importance of protecting and enhancing wildflowers in our urban greenspaces and river banks. Estimated reach 5,000 people.

• Will this project which involves planting trees /flowers, improving/creating habitats etc.



Native wildflowers and the insects and mammals they support are under threat in this area from litter, rank vegetation and invasive species. Changes in more extreme weather events such as hot, dry summers and heavier rainfall and flooding from climate change mean that our work to protect and manage this biodiversity is even more pressing than ever.
